You see this? It's called a **word balloon**.

It points to the person who is speaking.

Comics use word balloons, instead of quotation marks, to show when someone is talking. Cool, huh?

If you see a box like this, it's a **caption**.

Captions tell you the **place** and the **time** when things happen.

There are different-looking balloons to show you when someone is ...

thinking ...

SHOUTING ...

or whispering.

This box around me is called a **panel**. You read the balloons in a panel from left to right and from top to bottom. Easy right?
